Even the best garden patio or family-friendly deck needs a conversation piece.

The next time you spy a few pallets in need of a new purpose, build a pallet bar! With these easy-to-follow instructions, you can create a one-of-a-kind and functional piece of furniture. It's sure to be a hit at your next garden party or backyard cook-out.



WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- Two matching pallets
- Two 8-foot 2x4" boards
- Stone slab or pavers for the bar top
- One gallon of paint
- Paint brushes
- One 10-ounce tube of landscape/construction adhesive
- Twelve 2" screws



1 Selecting Your Bar Top A stone slab or pavers will serve as the top of the bar. The width of the bar top should be 1-2" wider than the pallet structure. Measure the height of your pallets in a stacked position and add 4" to the total.

The stone top can overhang longer at each end according to your preference.

Large brick pavers can be used like tiles on a countertop. Common sizes include 16x16" and 18x18" squares.

2 Cut Support Boards For assembly, the pallets will stand on their side (so that the series of boards that once served as the pallet's surface will be perpendicular to the ground). In this position, measure the height of your pallet.

Cut four lengths identical to the height of the pallets from your 2x4" boards.

3 Prepare and Paint Depending on the condition of your pallets, you may need to power wash the wood to remove dirt, grease, or other substances prior to painting. Once all the surfaces are clean, paint all the wood surfaces. Be sure to paint the inside and backside of the pallets as well as the 2x4" pieces.

4 Attach Support Boards Once dry, lay each pallet face down.

On the first pallet, use screws to attach the 2x4s to the outer edge support of the pallet, running in the same direction as the face-side boards. See **4A**.

Attach the remaining two 2x4s to the inner supports using landscape/construction adhesive. See **4B**.

Lay the second pallet on top of the exposed 2x4s to help weigh the 2x4s to the lower pallet until the adhesive dries. Once dried, make sure that the finished face of each pallet is outward facing and attach the second pallet to the 2x4s by gluing the inner boards and screwing the outermost boards.

5 Install the Bar Top Depending on the stone or pavers used and the weight of the entire piece, rest the stone on top or use the landscape/construction adhesive to secure the bar top to the pallets for added security.

Whatever you choose, don't be afraid to trim the finished piece for some additional customization. String lights around, under, and through the pallets to help set a party mood; plants or flowers present a welcoming aesthetic; and a hidden hook for a bottle opener or bar towel make entertaining even easier. The specifics are up to you!
